CAREER OVERVIEW

The majority of Medical and Clinical Laboratory Techs (Med Techs) work in either a hospital (50%) or in medical and diagnostic labs (23%). The job outlook is very positive.

WHAT A MED TECH DOES

Have you ever had blood drawn or given a urine sample at the doctor's office or hospital? A Med Tech is likely the person who collected the sample. They are also responsible for analyzing the results sent back by the lab.

Their work is important because it helps to: detect abnormalities, diseases, and other health issues early on; optimize patient outcomes; identify health issues before symptoms appear; and make informed decisions about diagnoses, treatment plans and patient care.

Their work is very detailed and methodical. They also are comfortable operating, calibrating, and maintaining the equipment used to run analyses.

GETTING STARTED

Due to the complexity and technical nature of the role, an Associate Degree is required to work as a Med Tech.
